St. Benedict Catholic Church Sunday September 27, 2020 Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

He Emptied Himself

In the Gospels, Jesus seldom teaches doctrine. Rather, the stories themselves provide examples of how we are to model our lives after him. He was a man for others, a compassionate healer, an understanding friend. As clear as such stories might be, because we can be selfish people, the example they offer us is difficult to follow. If it is hard to follow a man who lived a human life with others, how are we to follow the example sketched by Paul in today's second reading? Paul declares in Philippians: "Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus" (2:5). What attitude is he talking about? Jesus emptied himself of the preeminence that was rightly his as possessing "equality with God" (2:6). He did not demand that they treat him with the reverence and veneration that was due him. Rather, "he emptied himself...he humbled himself" (2:7, 8). Why does Paul insist on this? It seems the Philippians were having internal problems that were threatening their unity. Various forms of arrogance were tearing them apart: Don't you know who I am? I am a celebrity. I have more money. I know the right people. And who are you? Who do you know? What can you do? These attitudes of arrogance infect our communities even today. To this Paul proclaims: If Jesus, who "though he was in the form of God" (2:6) could empty himself of such dignity for the sake of others, you certainly should be able to put aside your trivial vainglory and be "united in heart" (2:2). Can we?

SUNDAY MASS OBLIGATION

Due to the ongoing Covid-19 coronavirus pandemic, Bishop Larry Silva has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass to all the people (and visitors) of the Diocese of Honolulu through October 31, 2020. All who are able to attend Sunday Mass without putting themselves or others at serious risk of infection, are encouraged to do so, but are not obliged to do so.

SACRAMENTS

<u>Funerals</u> may now take place again in St. Benedict Hall Chapel according to the same guidelines as weekend Masses, i.e. following all health and safety precautions. Funerals at this time may not include visitation times, only the Vigil for the Deceased, a Funeral Mass and Commital may be held.

<u>Baptisms</u> may take place accoding to the same guidelines as weekend Masses. They will be done in such a way that the same water is not poured on more than one person or stored in the font after use.

Call the office to arrange for a visit from a priest or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion.

OCTOBER – Month of the Holy Rosary

In October 1571 the Muslim Turks had conquered the Middle East and Greek Islands of Crete and Cyprus, slaughtering millions and forcing survivors to convert to Islam. Next they hoped to take the Christian kingdoms of Europe. As Rome was being threatened, Pope Pius V implored the European leaders to rally to defeat them. He also appealed to rosary confraternities in Rome and all of Europe to hold public rosaries and processions to ask the intercession of the Blessed Mother. On October 7, 1571, the Christian fleet, which was by far outnumbered, confronted the Muslims in the Gulf of Lepanto in an apparently hopeless battle. As Christians prayed their rosaries that day the Muslims surrounded the Christians but by the end of the day the Christian ships broke through and the Turks were pushed ashore or drowned. Pope Pius declared an annual celebration to honor Our Lady of Victory. His successor, Pope Gregory XIII decreed the first Sunday in October the Feast of the Holy Rosary, later extended to the entire month.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Lawrence Ruiz and Companions
Died 1637 FEAST DAY: September 28



Lawrence, the first Filipino saint, and 15 others were martyred in Japan. The ten Asians and six Europeans included nine Dominican priests. After various tortures, 14 of them died by being suspended by the feet in a pit of manure one was burned at the stake and one died in prison. Lawrence a Dominican tertiary, was living in Binando, Philippines, with his wife and three children, when he fled an unjust murder charge by joining a missionary expedition to Japan. He was arrested there for being a Christian, which was then illegal. He died in the pit in 1637.

Where does the tradition of praying with your hands together originate? I pray with my fingers intertwined. Is that acceptable?

According to the Caeremoniale Episcoporum (The Ceremonial of Bishops, 1985), "palms extended and joined together in the front of the breast, with the right thumb over the left in the form of a cross" (CE 107, n. 80) is the correct Catholic hand posture at Mass and prayer. The origin of praying with hands folded is not known, but there's mention of it in the Jewish Talmud. Historians have also asserted that it's modeled on the practice of citizens in ancient Rome who joined their hands in the presence of rulers to communicate loyalty and submission to that higher authority. Gestures and postures should allow our whole body to pray, as well as our heart and mind. Moreover, they are expressions of our faith. For example, like the early Christians, we stand during prayer and worship to express our readiness for Christ's return, and as a sign of reverence to hear the gospels. Kneeling and striking the breast are expressions of penitence, humility, and our lowliness before God. Likewise, at Mass the priest assumes the ancient posture of outstretched arms and hands, slightly elevated, to symbolize surrender in a gesture that reverences Christ's outstretched arms on the cross. When we join hands together in prayer, it's a gesture of supplication and a symbol of total submission to God, our supreme authority
