St. Benedict Catholic Church Sunday, August 19, 2018 Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus said to the crowd, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life...." We can hardly blame the crowd for their shock at this statement — eating the Flesh and drinking the Blood of our Lord should cause us a bit of a shock. Yet how easy it is to show up at Mass Sunday after Sunday, receiving the Eucharist as simply part of a weekly routine.



If we really spent time contemplating the gift our Lord is offering us in this sacrament, we would be awestruck at the love and power in this gift.

Through it, our Lord is giving us the very best He has to give — Himself. Not even the greatest theological scholar or the holiest of saints can fully understand this mystery.

Thankfully we don't need to be a saint or a scholar to receive this gift. But we should do our best to receive the Eucharist with gratitude. And we can look to today's readings to glean two fundamental principles for becoming better Christian stewards.

The Eucharist is the foundation for a stewardship way of life. Through His gift of the Eucharist, God fills us with His love and strength. This love and strength empower us to live as generous stewards — to be faithful to the ministries we serve in, joyful in material giving, and offer our very best to our families and secular work.

The Eucharist is the ultimate *inspiration* for a stewardship way of life. When we contemplate this gift of God, we will want to make a joyful return to Him. Mass will become anything but routine and we will live each day as His passionate disciples.

DEACON'S CORNER - Craig Camello-

Catholic Charities Hawaii (CCH) has been assisting Hawaii Island volcanic and earthquake disaster survivors since May. A young couple with an 8-year-old daughter were affected when the farm where they lived and worked was covered by lava. They lost everything they owned except for the items that fit into their vehicle when they were forced to evacuate. They then moved into the Pahoa Shelter with their daughter until the environment there became too difficult to deal with. Because they had a mortgage on a vacant lot in another area of the island, they decided to set up camp there until they could find work again and figure out what to do. After making the move, homes in their neighborhood began being robbed and vandalized, so they were afraid to leave their tent unattended. After meeting this couple, Catholic Charities Hawaii asked how we could best assist them. We provided financial assistance for them to build a gate and begin fencing their property to secure it. We also provided them with gift cards for clothing, food, personal items plus a cooler, camp stove and pot for preparing meals and boiling water as an important next-step on their pathway to self-sufficiency as disaster survivors. They hope to save enough money to build a tiny shed to house them temporarily on their property.
