REFLECTION ON LUKE <u>16:19-31</u>

Maybe the message is not just about rich and powerful people. If one thinks about how we live compared to the vast majority of people in the world, we are wealthy. We need to pay attention to the message in Luke's Gospel. The story of the rich man has implications for everyone.

What we have are gifts from God. They are a blessing, and God's blessings are to be shared. So we must each face the challenging questions: How am I doing sharing the blessings God has gifted to me? How are others doing? How is the wealth of our country shared?

The parable about Lazarus and the rich man reminds us to consider what kind of legacy each of us will leave, before our time on earth is done.

Father Sieg will be available to hear confessions 20 minutes before each of the weekend Masses or by appointment.





FAITH FORMATION

NOTES ON THE LIFE OF FRANCIS OF ASSISI

St. Francis was born in Assisi, Italy in 1181 and was named Giovanni di Bernardone. His father was a rich silk merchant. He called his son Francesco. Francis became the leader of a crowd of young people who spent their nights in wild parties. He worked successfully in his father's business but was not satisfied. He became a knight and sought glory in battle against a nearby town, Perugia. He was captured. When ransomed he went back to his life of sin. One day he came face to face with a leper. He was repelled by the appearance and smell but he jumped off his horse and kissed the hand of the leper in a sign of peace. The leper disappeared and Francis took that as a test from God which he passed. He went to the ancient church at San Damiano. While praying, Francis heard Christ on the crucifix speak to him, "Francis, repair my church". Francis thought Jesus was telling him to repair the old church he was in. He stole fabric from his father's store and sold it to buy materials to restore the church. His father took him before the bishop and demanded he repay the money and renounce all of his inheritance rights. Francis went on to preach and to live a life of poverty. His preaching touched a noblewoman, Clare of Assisi, who, like him left her wealthy family to follow his rule. He established the Order of Poor Ladies, later called Poor Clares, and housed them in a nearby monastery of Benedictine nuns. He also established the Third Order for those who wanted to follow him but couldn't leave their homes. He continued to preach, though he never became a priest. He was ordained a deacon against his will. Francis is also known for loving all of God's creation and had a special relationship with the animals. One famous story about him tells of him preaching to hundreds of birds about being thankful to God for their "clothes", independence and God's care. The birds stood still as he walked among them, only flying away when he said they could leave. Another story tells of the townspeople wanting to kill a wolf that was eating human beings in the village. He intervened and talked the wolf into never killing again. The wolf became a pet of the townspeople. Later, Francis became very ill. As he prayed to share in Christ's passion he had a vision and received the stigmata, the wounds Jesus had suffered, in his own body. He died October 4, 1226 at the age of 45.
