### St. Benedict Catholic Church Sunday May 10, 2020 Fifth Sunday of Easter

#### What is God really Like?

That is a very profound question, asked by children and adults alike. Answers range from the image of an old man in a white robe with a beard; the all-seeing eye on the back of the dollar bill; "the big guy" up there. Such answers seem frivolous when we think about the dynamic force behind the Big Bang from which evolved everything in the billions of galaxies that we know exist. What is such a God really like? The disciples were probably not thinking of astrophysics when they asked Jesus about God. Their questions flowed from Jesus' constant reference to God as Father. That title in itself tells us something about God. It tells us that God, like a father, is the source of Jesus' being and existence. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples that he is about to return to his Father. He also assures them that they also will have a place with the Father. However, like us, they still are not sure what this Father is like. Jesus responds to their lack of understanding and suggests: "Look at me!" His life is lived for others. He is one who cares for those in need rather than walks past them, who forgives rather than condemns, who endures misunderstanding without retaliating, who tolerates the pettiness of others without being snide. Why is it so hard for us to realize that this is what God is really like?

# Dear Padre,

### Are there models I can use to help me better understand what a mother is to do or be?

A great model for mothers is the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Catechism of the Catholic Church uses the titles of Advocate, Helper, Benefactress, and Mediatrix when speaking of Mary (CCC 969). These titles are important in explaining Mary's special relationship to us, her children. We can also use these titles to show how mothers today can relate to their children and spouses. Mary encourages us in our efforts to follow Christ. So it is the duty of all mothers to be a guiding presence to their children as they begin to pray and learn to follow the Lord. As Advocate and Helper, Mary assists us by her own prayer and example. Mary prays for us, and we only have to read Scripture to understand Mary's example of listening to God. Today's mothers share the task of praying for their children and spouses. A mother's example of listening for God can teach her children the importance of seeking God's will. As Benefactress, Mary is a patron and invites us to receive the graces that only her Son can bestow. In today's family, a mother offers a constant stream of love and encouragement to her spouse and children. She is the patron of love, a refuge from the harshness that life can bring. As Mediatrix, Mary brings people together to be coworkers with Christ in the work of salvation. Also, a mother is a mediator, a coworker with Christ, helping her children and spouse on their journeys toward salvation. Her family is a little church where heaven and salvation are proclaimed. ## A HAWAII CATHOLIC HERALD INTERVIEW WITH BISHOP LARRY SILVA ON SHEPHERDING THE FLOCK DURING A PANDEMIC

Hawaii Catholic Herald: What's been your biggest challenge during this time of the coronavirus pandemic?

**Bishop Larry Silva:** The biggest challenge has been making the decision to cancel public liturgies. The Eucharist is the source and summit of who we are as a Church, the ultimate intimate communion with the risen Lord Jesus. And now, because we cannot meet in large groups and must basically stay home, this decision has been a great burden. Of course, it is a burden mostly on the faithful who are not able to participate in the Eucharist, but the decision is certainly burdensome to me.

#### Herald: How has this experience affected you personally?

**Bishop Silva:** This has been an extremely hectic time. In addition to all my normal responsibilities, I have been inundated with decisions to make about liturgical issues, financial issues, employment issues, and programs related to the poor and the homeless — all of which have become critical because of the coronavirus pandemic.

#### Herald: How is your health?

**Bishop Silva:** Thanks be to God, my health is fine. I do try to take a walk at least every other day, usually around the campus of St. Stephen Diocesan Center, where I live.

### Herald: Have you been getting feedback from Catholics for your decisions to cancel or postpone services? Has it been negative? Supportive?

**Bishop Silva:** I think most Catholics understand the need to cancel or postpone services, even though it saddens them very much. I have received a few complimentary letters or emails in support of what I am doing. There are a few people, however, who think I have lost faith and am not being true to my responsibility as the chief shepherd of the diocese. I continually examine my conscience over this issue. Basically, I feel I am doing the right thing under the circumstances, but I do pray often for God's mercy and strength to do what is right.

#### Herald: What reaction have you received regarding your livestreamed and televised liturgies?

**Bishop Silva:** I have received very positive reactions to the livestreamed liturgies. There were some technical glitches at first, and I was happy people pointed them out so we could correct them. Of course, even though the livestreamed liturgies are important to so many people, no one pretends that this is in any way optimal. We all want to come back and worship together as soon as possible. Another aspect of this is how weird it is to preach to a camera rather than a congregation. The only saving grace is knowing that through that camera lens I am actually reaching hundreds or thousands of people with the Gospel of Jesus.
