# St. Benedict Catholic Church Sunday May 17, 2020 Sixth Sunday of Easter

### **What Is Your Hope?**

What Is Your Hope? We have hopes for ourselves and others. We hope for good health, for fulfilling work, for settled lives for our children. As valuable as such hope might be, that is not what Peter is referring to in today's second reading. He is talking about religious hope. Not hope that, but hope in. Not hope that God will give us what we ask, that God will supply what we cannot

accomplish, that God will reward our faithfulness. That is also valid hope, but it is still not religious hope. Genuine religious hope is hope or trust in God. Period. Trust in God when we have no idea what the future might bring. Trust in God when all our best plans crumble before us. Trust in God when we face the terrors of illness and death. This is a trust or hope for which we do not provide God plans to follow so our needs get met as we think they should be. It is a hope that enables us to place ourselves into the hands of God. Period. This kind of hope asks for nothing and expects everything. Why? Because we are convinced that God loves us with a passion we can't possibly imagine and, therefore, wants what is best for us. This might seem like an impossible hope, but the reading goes on to list reasons to hope. God's love is exemplified by Jesus Christ, who "suffered for sins...that he might lead you to God" (1 Peter 3:18). Who could ask for more? ©2020 Liguori Publications • Liguori, MO

# After Mass a friend told me I belonged to "the priesthood of believers." I'm not a priest! What did she mean?

At baptism, all of us became part of the laity. The word laity comes from the Greek word laos, which means "people." The laity are the people of God. As people of God, we all share in the priesthood of Christ. This is why the Church speaks of the "priesthood of all believers," because when we were baptized we were incorporated into Christ's priesthood. Each of us is called to exercise our common priesthood within the Church, strengthening and serving each other. The exercise of priesthood means, above all, to serve. The Church speaks of Jesus as our High Priest, the one who offers himself as the sacrificial animal. Jesus is the priest and victim, offering himself as a sacrifice to God. The priesthood that Jesus exercises is one of self-giving. All those who are called to the priesthood of Christ are called to serve as he did, offering themselves in a spirit of service and love. This "priesthood of all believers" shouldn't be confused with the sacrament of Holy Orders, which ordains to the office of bishop, priest, or deacon. These men are called by God and ordained by the Church to exercise the particular ministry of preaching the good news and administering the sacraments, especially the Eucharist. During Mass, the ordained priest represents Christ and also acts on behalf of all the people of God. His sacramental priesthood represents the common priesthood of the whole Church.

# A HAWAII CATHOLIC HERALD INTERVIEW WITH BISHOP LARRY SILVA ON SHEPHERDING THE FLOCK DURING A PANDEMIC

(Continued from 05/10/2020 bulletin)

Herald: Do you have plans for this year's Elect receiving the sacraments of initiation?

**Bishop Silva:** This is not a firm decision since the situation is so fluid, but my thought is to ask the pastors to celebrate at least one of the Scrutinies (one of the steps in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults), either on a Sunday or a weekday, then to ask them to choose a Sunday in the Easter season when they would like to celebrate the sacraments of initiation.

Herald: Do you have plans for this year's Confirmations?

**Bishop Silva:** Again, the fluidity of the situation will determine what actually happens, but I was thinking perhaps I could do Confirmation/first Communion liturgies on weeknights at various parishes as well as on weekends. I might also see if neighboring parishes might be open to combining for this celebration so that I can catch up more quickly.

Herald: Do you personally know people who have been diagnosed with COVD-19, or their families, who have asked for prayers or reached out to you?

Bishop Silva: I have known of a few people who either showed symptoms or who tested positive for COVID-19. For the most part, they are now recovered, thanks be to God!

Herald: Your Easter homilies have been messages of hope. One result of this pandemic is an outpouring of charity, courage and cooperation. What other good have you seen come from this crisis?

**Bishop Silva:** I am often amazed at how many of our people and parishes have outreach programs to the poor and needy, but this time of pandemic has brought even more generosity and heroism. I commend all who work our food pantries and other services that reach out to those who are most in need. Our diocesan staff has also been working very hard to assure that our parishes and schools are able to weather the economic storm that has come with the pandemic. HOPE Services, Inc., one of our Church's social service agencies on the Big Island, has been doing an outstanding job, as have Catholic Charities Hawaii and our Office of Social Ministry. They are the real messengers of hope! (To be continued...)
