

Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Eat and Drink



Bread and wine, the basics for most Mediterranean diets, are featured in the readings for this feast. They were the gifts that were offered to God Most High by the priest-king Melchizedek, as stated in Genesis. Since these gifts represent the staples of life, such a sacrifice was offered because it symbolized the offering of life itself. Who was this mysterious man who blessed Abram when Abram usually blessed others? We have no answer. This theme of bread and wine shifts a bit in the Gospel passage. There the meal consisted of bread and fish, traditional fare of fisher folk. Hence, this meal also symbolized life. We stand open-mouthed when we

realize the multitude of people who were fed on such a sparse amount of food. How could this happen? Mystery abounds! In the first reading the essence of life is offered to God. In the Gospel the essence of life is offered to the people. It is in Paul's letter that we find the high point of the readings and of the feast itself. There Paul proclaims what was probably one of the earliest eucharistic formulas of the early Church. It ends with an admonition from Christ himself: "Do this in remembrance of me" (1 Corinthians 11:24). Here the bread and wine that was first offered to God, and then offered to the people, is the very Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. This remembrance of his death is really a celebration of life. The mystery here is incomprehensible

COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

*IF YOU ARE FEELING ILL OR HAVE OUTWARD SYMPTOMS PLEASE STAY HOME! * MASKS ARE NOW OPTIONAL.

Safe distance is no longer required in Church or in meeting places. Food can be shared only if served by designated persons wearing masks or if individually pre-packaged.

Exposed (close contact) to COVID-19 is defined as being within 6 feet of a person with COVID-19 for 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period (regardless of mask use).

SACRAMENTS

<u>Funerals</u> may now take place again in St. Benedict Hall Chapel according to the same guidelines as weekend Masses, i.e. following all health and safety precautions. Please contact the office for most current guidelines.

<u>Baptisms</u> may take place according to the same guidelines as weekend Masses. They will be done in such a way that the same water is not poured on more than one person or stored in the font after use.

SAINT OF THE WEEK -ST. ALOYISIUS GONZAGA 1568-1591 Feast Day June 21st



In early years Jesuits went on their missionary journeys singly. There was little "community" identity. To bring them closer together they were required to write letters to their superiors on a regular basis, telling about their work and experiences. The letters were instructing and inspiring.

They became known as 'Jesuit Relations' and were even published and distributed outside the Order. One of these letters, from India, inspired Aloysius Gonzaga to become a Jesuit. Called Luigi, he was born into a large aristocratic family, the oldest of seven children. He loathed the shallow existence of the people he was surrounded by. After receiving First Communion at age 12, he came to know the future St. Charles Borromeo, Jesuit, who later became his confessor and spiritual director. He soon entered the Jesuit novitiate against his family's wishes. He went to Rome for his studies and there worked with those of lesser status and education. Although he was disgusted by their conditions he volunteered to take those with the plague to the Jesuit hospital. His own physical limitations finally prevented him from continuing this Corporal Work of Mercy. He still returned to work with those stricken by the plague until he contracted the disease himself from a patient he was personally caring for and he died on June 21, 1591 at age 23. He had gained a reputation for purity, prayerfulness and quiet suffering so there were calls for his sainthood almost immediately. He was beatified 14 years later and canonized in 1726. He had accomplished no great feats but he died young, holy and greatly respected.

Dear Padre,

Don't we discriminate against other Christians when we don't celebrate the Eucharist with them?

You must keep the Church's intentions in mind: Are we excluding to make people feel left out, or are we excluding to uphold the dignity and sanctity of the Eucharist? Everyone is welcome to celebrate the Eucharist—there's only one part they can't participate in. That might sound like a cop-out, but Catholics believe that the Eucharist is the actual Body and Blood of Christ. For it to be true communion, everyone who receives it must believe the same thing about it. In its "Guidelines for the Reception of Communion," the US Conference of Catholic Bishops says, "Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of...the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission" as outlined in "canon law....All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another."
