"For God So Loved the World..."

When we hear this phrase from John 3:16, we think of God's love for human beings—and rightly so. However, today's first reading reminds us that God's love is much broader. This reading offers us a glimpse into God's love of all natural creation. The Greek word translated "world," the word found in the passage from John as well as today's reading, is "*kósmos*," a word we think of today as "universe." So we could say: "God so loved the cosmos." The author of the Book of Wisdom insists that God loves whatever God has made; that the power of the Creator is matched by the Creator's love; and that this love is manifested through mercy to all. We are accustomed to hearing how God cares for us with holy abandon. This reading expands that love to include a tiny grain of sand or the morning dew. An even more daring statement claims that God's imperishable spirit is in all things. How else could anything exist? This fact is the basis of what is referred to as "the intrinsic value of the entire natural world," which means that everything has unique value simply because it was created by God—not because we can use it to enhance ourselves. This kind of thinking might be new to many. However, it calls us to revere elements of nature like trees, flowers, wolves, and even mosquitos, because they are creatures of God. Our faith insists that "God so loved the cosmos."

Sacrament of Reconciliation

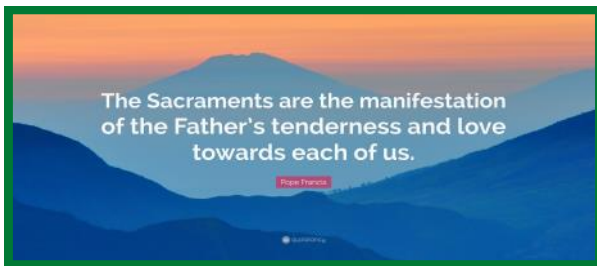
At this time Father Sieg is available for Confessions by appointment, observing all proper precautions. Call the office 328-2227.

SAINT OF THE WEEK– FEAST DAY NOVEMBER 3RD ST. MARTIN de PORRES 1579—1639

St. Martin de Porres was a Dominican mystic and friend of St. Rose of Lima. He was born in Lima, Peru, the illegitimate son of a Spanish knight, John de Porres, and a freed Panamanian slave named Anna. He was teased

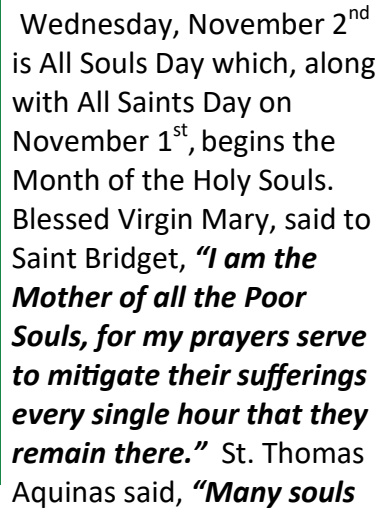


and scorned for being of "mixed race". His father left Martin, his young sister, and his mother when Martin was eight leaving them in poverty. Martin, however, sacrificed and shared everything he had to help others who were also destitute. At age 12 he worked for a barber and learned

to cut hair and heal wounds. Later he wanted to become a Dominican but at that time Peruvian law did not allow mixed race persons to enter religious life so he worked for them as a servant. In 1594, Martin, because of his good works and miraculous healings, became a Dominican lay brother in Lima and eventually founded orphanages and took care of lonely African slaves forced to come to Lima. Outside of the monastery he became known for his care of the poor and the sick. He was aided by St. Rose of Lima, who had great respect for his penances and labors. Martin experienced many mystical gifts, including bilocation and aerial flights. When he was dying in Rosary Convent on November 3, the viceroy, the count of Chichón, knelt by his bed, seeking Martin's blessing. Everyone in Lima mourned his death. Martin, who is the patron of interracial justice and of those who suffer from discrimination, was canonized by Pope John XXIII in 1962.

Dear Padre,

My aunt has terminal cancer. Her doctors have advised her to stop chemotherapy and begin palliative care, but she says that's equivalent to assisted suicide. Is that what the Church thinks?

Palliative care doesn't prolong life, but neither does it cause life to end. The bishops are quite clear that palliative care is neither euthanasia nor assisted suicide, both of which are always sinful. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says treating or not treating a patient in a way that will cause death is always murder (**CCC 2277**). However, a patient's choice to discontinue "burdensome, dangerous, extraordinary" treatment "can be legitimate" when it's done not to cause death, but in recognition of "one's inability to impede it" (**CCC 2278**). But even when death seems to be close, "ordinary care" that would be given to any sick person cannot be interrupted (**CCC 2279**). Palliative care does not cause death. It gives terminally ill people spiritual support and relief from their physical symptoms. An excellent resource on this topic, "Killing the Pain, Not the Patient: Palliative Care vs. Assisted Suicide," is available at usccb.org. The Catechism says palliative care "should be encouraged" (**CCC 2279**). It helps the dying person and the family focus on the gift of life and the blessing each person is. The patient who legitimately chooses palliative care is not waiting to die but rather living those last moments to the fullest and as comfortably as possible.
