The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Hail, Christ Our King

The readings for today's feast create a collage of images that capture different characteristics of Christ's kingship. "Shepherd" assures us his kingly rule is characterized by tenderness. "King of Israel" locates him squarely within human time and space. "Image of the Invisible God" acclaims his divine origin. "Firstborn of all Creation" places him over the entire created world. "Source of all Created Things" acknowledges



him as the model after which all things were fashioned. "Head of the Body, the Church" underscores the intimacy and interrelationship between him and all those joined to him through faith and baptism. "Firstborn of the Dead" acclaims his resurrection and guarantees the resurrection of those who will follow him into death. The Gospel's image of Christ as the crucified king clearly interprets all the other images. He is a shepherd who protects his flock with his life, a king who rules with dedication despite shame and defeat, divine yet accepted death on a cross. He was God who became a "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." LUKE 23:42 vulnerable child of earth, a simple man who offered himself as sacrifice, the one through whom we will all enjoy resurrection from the dead. In the last words of the Gospel, Jesus opens the gates of his kingdom to a repentant sinner: "Today you will be with me in Paradise." This is what all of us long to hear, words that are empty when coming from one who has no authority, but charged with power when spoken by the one who is king over us all.

All remaining Covid-19 liturgical restrictions are lifted except for the suspension of the distribution of the Precious Blood to the congregation.

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SAINT OF THE WEEK- FEAST DAY NOVEMBER 25TH SAINT CATHERINE OF ALEXANDRIA C. 282—305



Catherine was the daughter of Constus, governor of Alexandria, Egypt, during the reign of the Roman emperor, Maxentius. As a child she read all the books she could find and she asked questions of all the wisest people in the land. Through her studies she learned

about Christianity and converted at about age 14. At 18, she debated 50 pagan philosophers and her wisdom and skills were so great that all of them were converted. Later she also brought many of the pagan emperor's soldiers and members of the emperor's family, including his wife to follow the way of Christ. All of them were martyred. Maxentius still did not want to kill Catherine. He told her if she denied her faith she could be his wife and become Empress. She said "No, my heart belongs only to Christ." After that the emperor ordered Catherine to be tied to a large wheel with sharp spikes and be tortured. The ropes fell off of her and the wheel flew apart in all directions. She was then beheaded.

St. Catherine of Alexandria was one of the *Fourteen Holy Helpers*, saints who were intercessors for many miracles during the Black Plague from 1346 to 1353 when millions of people died. The 14 were Acacius, Barbara, Blaise, Catherine of <u>Alexandria</u>, Christopher, Cyriacus,

Dionysius of Paris, Erasmus, Eustace, George, Margaret, Pantaleon, Vitus and Giles. The 14 had their feast day in the Church on August 8th until it was suppressed in 1969 due to the revision of the Catholic Calendar.

In her diary, St. Faustina wrote "I saw my Guardian Angel, who ordered me to follow him. In a moment I was in a misty place full of fire in which there was a great crowd of suffering souls. They were praying fervently, but to no avail, for themselves; only we can come to their aid. The flames which were burning them did not touch me at all. My Guardian

Angel did not leave me for an instant. I asked these souls what their greatest suffering was. They answered me in one voice that their greatest torment was longing for God. I saw Our Lady visiting the souls in Purgatory. The souls call her "The Star of the Sea." She brings them refreshment. I wanted to talk with them some more, but my Guardian Angel beckoned me to leave. We went out of that prison of suffering. [I heard an interior voice] which said, "My mercy does not want this, but justice demands it." Since that time, I am in closer communion with the suffering souls."

Dear Padre,

Can all good people go to heaven after they die, even if they haven't been a Christian? My dad is from India and grew up with another religion. The rest of my family is Catholic. I am afraid that we won't see each other again after we die.

Put your mind at ease. A person who is a not a Christian can go to heaven. Heaven is not just for Christians, but for everyone who loves God and responds to God's will in his or her life. We know that God wants all people to be saved, not just Christians. Jesus began a Church to help people achieve salvation. The Church teaches that those who seek "the truth and [do] the will of God in accordance with their understanding of it can be saved" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1260). What we know as Catholics is that God called us into the Church. It is there that we will work out our salvation. "Since Christ died for all, and since all are called to one and the same destiny, which is divine," we must believe that the Holy Spirit makes a way for everyone, a way that only God knows (CCC 1260). You should pray for your dad and be a faithful Catholic. Perhaps your good example will help him become a Christian. Even if he never becomes a Christian, your prayers will help him work out his salvation without the benefit of the sacraments and a believing community. If he does what is right, God will reward him.
