A Call from the Wild

Sometimes, as if by divine instinct, life draws us into new and uncharted lands, a kind of "call of the wild." It happens when we leave childhood, when (if) we leave the single life, and when we grieve the loss of love or health. The call, then, is also to trust that God will walk with us and show us the way through the coming wilderness. At other times that wild divine instinct is to go where we would rather not go, but somehow we also sense we must, if for no other reason than to be true to ourselves. It happened to Jesus, as this week's Gospel begins with our Lord picking up where John the Baptist left off. "When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee....From that time on he began to

preach" (Matthew 4:12, 17). Who could know where that divine instinct would lead him? Sometimes that call pulls us into what life needs at this moment, whether we choose it or not. It may come in the face of the premature death of a spouse that finds us raising a young

family alone, or it may be an aging spouse's needs that require us to be a caregiver. It may be the daily grind of a job we can't stand but have to keep for one reason or another, or it may be no job at all that forces us to reorganize our lives. The call of God may come out of the blue and from the

Updated Covid-19 Liturgical Directives and Cold & Flu Guidelines

All remaining Covid-19 liturgical restrictions are lifted except for the suspension of the distribution of the Precious Blood to the congregation.

As always, you are reminded to use common sense for your health and safety during the annual cold and flu season. If you are feeling ill or think you may have been exposed to a virus, you should refrain from coming to Mass. In the same way, you should refrain from offering your hand to others at the sign of peace. A smile and a heartfelt "Peace be with you" should suffice. All of us must be aware of such sensitive matter in the intimate life of the Christian community and we should expect that some will refrain from a physical expression of the sign of peace out of care of our well-being and not out of unkindness or lack of piety.

SAINT OF THE WEEK- FEAST DAY JANUARY 22 BLESSED WILLIAM JOSEPH CHAMINADE S.M.



Blessed William Chaminade was born in France in 1761, the 14th child of deeply religious parents. Three of his brothers became priests so he followed them, entering the seminary at age ten. He was ordained a diocesan priest in 1785. In

1790 at the start of the French Revolution he became an enemy of the state for defying the Civil Constitution of the Clergy which would have required him to take an oath affirming the Revolution's secular values and denying the authority of the Roman Catholic Church. He continued to work as a priest, risking the death penalty. In 1795 the French government lessened the restrictions on priests Chaminade took on the task of supervising the reconciliation of the clergy of Bordeaux who had taken the oath. After a coup took place in 1797 he fled to Saragoza, Spain taking refuge for 3 years and developed a deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin as he regularly visited the Basilica of Our Lady of the Pillar. This led to a vision of restoring Catholic faith to France. He formed a society of priests, brothers and laymen with Mary as its model of discipleship: the Society of Mary, or the Marianists. He helped to start other teaching and training schools. He lived his last 10 years in poor health and others took over the work. The Marianists' work spread to the U.S. in 1850 where they established 3 universities—in Texas, Ohio and Hawaii, as well as 18 high schools. He died in 1850, age 88. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II, 9/03/2000.



Dear Padre,

Could you explain "lead us not into temptation" from the Lord's Prayer? That doesn't seem like something God would do. Part of the problem lies in the translation of the Greek verb. Lead is the word used. but it means a request that we not enter into or yield to temptation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2846). As we read in the Letter of James, "No one experiencing temptation should say, 'I am being tempted by God'; for God is not subject to temptation to evil, and he himself tempts no one" (James 1:13). Pope Francis agrees with you that this translation is confusing. He has approved changing this one line of the Lord's Prayer from "lead us not into temptation" to "do not let us fall into temptation." This wording places the focus on us and our activity, as the original Greek implies. It is a plea that we do nothing to put ourselves in the way of temptation or give in to temptation. This change will appear in the latest edition of the Italian Roman Missal, but there are no plans now to change the wording in English-speaking countries. If you would like to read more about the Lord's Prayer, the Catechism includes an article that goes into a lot of detail (CCC 2777-2865).
