God Up There, God Down Here FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

"One God and Father of all who is over all and through all and in all." Ephesians 4:6



Which of these images best describes your God: gardener, friend, policeman, Santa Claus, magician, doctor, lover, parent, judge, the Force? Theologically, God is both transcendent and immanent, up there and down here. In other words, God is powerful, majestic, awesome, and all-knowing but always close, caring for us, forgiving, and comforting. Most of us lean toward one or the other in our spirituality. Whichever image you choose will tell you something about how you usually relate to God. None of the images are

necessarily right or wrong unless it locks us into relating to God in only one way. Our tendency to relate to God as either transcendent or immanent may influence our preference for liturgical style. If we view God primarily as transcendent, we will. tend to appreciate the Mass as a sacrifice, celebrated formally with processions, incense, and majestic music. If we tend to relate to God as more immanent, we will tend to appreciate the Mass as a eucharistic meal with the community gathered around the altar table singing simpler music. As God is both transcendent and immanent, we should not have to choose. The ideal liturgical style would incorporate something of both transcendence and immanence. Today's story of Moses, who climbs Mount Sinai and there bows down in worship before God, is a story of the transcendence of God—majestic, powerful, awesome to behold. Today's gospel is of an immanent God who loved the world so much that he sent his Son, not to condemn it but to save it.

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Is your personal prayer to God "up there" or to God "walking with me"?

Updated Covid-19 Liturgical Directives and Cold & Flu Guidelines

Bishop Larry Silva has decided to allow parishes to restore Holy Communion under both kinds, on Holy Thursday, April 6th, at the pastor's discretion. As always, you are reminded to use **common sense** for your health and safety during the annual cold and flu season. If you are feeling ill or think you may have been exposed to a virus, you should refrain from coming to Mass. In the same way, you should refrain from offering your hand to others at the sign of peace. A smile and a heartfelt "Peace be with you" should suffice. All of us must be aware of such sensitive matter in the intimate life of the Christian community and we should expect that some will refrain from a physical expression of the sign of peace out of care of our well-being and not out of unkindness or lack of piety.

A WORD FROM POPE FRANCIS

SAINT OF THE WEEK - FEAST DAY JUNE 6TH ST. NORBERT OF XANTEN c. 1080— 1134 A.D.

St. Norbert was born in Rhineland (Germany) of nobility. As a youth he was educated at the collegiate Church of St. Victor in Xanten where he learned literature and the ways of the court and the world. He was made a deacon but had no interest in the priesthood. At the time he was a tall, handsome young man who was quite eloquent and likeable and he sought the approval of the courts, the emperor and his many friends. Norbert used his gifts to gain the favor of men and not the glory of God. He had no time for piety or meditation. He lived according to his own desires. But soon Norbert observed Emperor Henry V treating Pope Paschal II in Rome badly when he traveled there in 1111. Later that year he was riding to Freden on his horse, accompanied by a servant. A bolt of lightning struck and Norbert was thrown from his horse to the ground. He was shaken and when he came to his senses he said, "Lord, what do you want me to do?" He seemingly heard this response from Psalm 34, "Turn from evil and do good, seek peace and pursue it." He experienced a deep conversion. He was ordained and unlike the custom at the time, he celebrated Mass daily. He was skilled at reconciling people and reuniting feuding parties. He became well-known as an exorcist. He established his first monastery in 1121 and attracted many men and women to apostolic life. In 1142 Norbert was elected Archbishop of Magdeburg, Germany. He worked to defend the Church and the Eucharist until he died June 6.1134. St. Norbert is venerated as the Apostle and Defender of the Eucharist. He is patron saint of Czech Republic (formerly Czechoslovakia), and also patron of childbirth and infertile couples. The Norbertines work and teach in many countries today.







Through Mary's intercession and by the model that she put forth for us, we can engage more deeply in the life of the Most Blessed Trinity. As Mary did, we can say "yes" to the will of the Father, unite our hearts to the love of the Holy Spirit, and join in proclaiming the Kingdom with our Lord, Jesus.

FAITH FORMATION



Two relatives of mine died from a disease for which they never sought treatment. Both said, "God will heal me if that is his will." Wldn't God have wanted them to see a doctor?

It is safe to say that God would have them see a doctor. Does doing so compromise our faith in God? No. Throughout all of salvation history, God has relied on human beings to be his instruments, his messengers. While we believe in God, who can and has acted miraculously throughout history, these moments are exceptions, not the rule. Ordinarily, God's work is done by human hands. The spread of the gospel itself has come about through people who have responded to God in faith. Part of this gospel story is the healing ministry of Jesus. Christianity has from the beginning taken up Jesus' ministry of healing and attempted to restore health to the sick, not only through prayer and the sacraments but also through institutions that care for the sick and the dying. Even as we recognize that our primary relationship is with God, we must also see that caring for our lives and our health, gifts from that same God, is a responsible way to receive and be good stewards of these gifts. Think of the training, knowledge, and experience that doctors, nurses, and all other health-care practitioners have spent years attaining. Is not their work a miracle of God's love when it brings healing, restoration, and renewal?
