# The Challenge to Enter through the "Narrow Gate"

Modern psychology gives great importance to "feeling good" and "loving oneself" as a precondition to love others. But in today's Gospel passage, Jesus warns us that there is no easy way to be his disciples as He declares that the Kingdom of God can be "accessed" only through a "narrow gate."

Discipleship is never meant to be the equivalent of

"looking out for number one." Obviously, Jesus is not speaking of a material gate but of the "narrow gate" of daily faithfulness to one's duties and the loyal observance of God's law in all circumstances of life. That is what makes life challenging, but that is also the only way that leads to eternal happiness in heaven. In this Eucharist, let us ask for the grace to have the moral strength to choose the "narrow gate" of keeping God's commandments in preference to the wide gate of self-entitlement, self-indulgence and other forms of self-gratification.

## First Reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah 66:18-21

Through the prophet Isaiah, today the Lord reminds us that His plan encompasses all human beings and cultures. We, too, are part of that wonderful plan conceived by God's immense love for all.

### Second Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 12:5-7.11-13

The author of the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that the difficulties and sufferings we have to endure in life are ways through which God disciplines us as His children, for our greater good.

## **Gospel Luke 13:22-30**

The possibility of belonging to the Kingdom of heaven is open to all, but subject to a basic condition: to live a life according to the teaching of Jesus. That is the "narrow gate" that leads to everlasting life.

# **Becoming Holy Disciples**

**Today's** readings show us that it is not enough to be Christ's disciples in name only. To be a real disciple, we must live for Christ every day and in every aspect of life. This kind of life takes strength and discipline.

Intentionally and consistently offering the Lord the best of our Time, Talent, and Treasure through a stewardship way of life is a form of spiritual discipline. These spiritual disciplines teach us to become ever more aware of God's constant provision for us and they keep us on the narrow path towards the Kingdom of Heaven. The more we embrace this way of life, the more we can be "trained" by the Lord in the ways of true discipleship. Though difficult, these disciplines become a source of spiritual strength.

Our Lord Himself speaks of the difficult path to the Kingdom of Heaven in today's Gospel passage from Luke. He is asked, "Lord, will only a few be saved?" Jesus responds, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough." Showing up for Mass on Sunday while living as if Christ is an afterthought the rest of the week does not make us disciples. What's more, this approach to our faith is an unjust and unloving response to our good God who has given us all that we have and are.

Jesus does not want us to merely go through the motions of faith. He wants much more from us and for us. He wants to know us deeply and for us to get to know Him so that we become His holy disciples. This is not a burden; it is a privilege. But it does take discipline, the discipline of a stewardship way of life.

# Dear Padre,

My wife mentioned that neither the Book of Mormon nor the Catholic Bible mentions purgatory. Please comment.

A not-uncommon frustration is when a person searches the Bible for a particular word or phrasing. Frankly, it is expecting too much from the religious text to be able to faithfully record a particular word or phrase that originated hundreds of years after the ancient text was composed. Purgatory is one such example of this frustration. The concept of purgatory is referenced in the biblical text, particularly in 2 Corinthians 5:10 and 7:1, Hebrews 9:27 and 12:14, and 2 Maccabees 12:46, but the word is never used. This should come as no real surprise because it was not until the writings of St. Thomas Aguinas (1225-1274) that the concept was expanded and formed into a theological statement of belief that has become central to Roman Catholicism.

And what is that belief? The Catechism of the Catholic Church is clear: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC, 1030, 1031a). The Book of Mormon never references purgatory, but it does speak about the afterlife and the experience of "waiting" in the spirit world for the completion of earthly time. • Fr. Thomas M. 


