Will You Notice the Shoot? ANN M. GARRIDO

Today's first reading from the prophet Isaiah offers a familiar Advent image: the shoot sprouting from the stump of Jesse. The verses immediately preceding speak of God walking through the forest with an ax: "The tall of stature shall be felled, and the lofty ones shall be brought low" (Isaiah 10:33). But now, amidst all the destruction, a tiny sign of new life emerges, and the Spirit of God descends upon it, bearing many gifts wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, awe, delight. So often, when we scroll through the news, our attention is captured by violence and war and the "mighty" who make great noise when they fall. "Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees," echoes John the Baptist in today's gospel. If we are looking for where God's Spirit can be found, however, Isaiah reminds us we will need to look elsewhere. We will need to attend to the quiet, fragile resurrections taking place below the surface when it appears as if all has been lost. If we seek wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, awe, and delight, we will need to look where the little ones of the earth are found. We must have our eyes open for the shoots. The gospels emphasize that Jesus was one such little one. Although the glory days of his people seemed to have come to a crashing close, they have not. In him, we glimpse the truth that life is stronger than death. We see that the future has not been erased, no matter how terrible the past. In him, we find our hope. •

Reflect: Are my eyes open to the small signs of God's work in the world, or am I too distracted to notice?

Prepare the Way of the Lord!

As we progress in our spiritual pilgrimage toward the shrine of Jesus' manger, on this Second Sunday of Advent, St. John the Baptist reminds us that we need to prepare ourselves adequately for our encounter with the Lord. We must prove the seriousness of our resolve to change for the better, each of us in our own situation. St. Paul gives us some practical tips about what this preparation can mean, as he invites us to live in perfect harmony with one another, accepting one another as Christ has accepted us. Only on these conditions shall we be able to glorify God with one voice and one heart as loving children should, particularly in this Advent Season.

First Reading: Book of the Prophet Isaiah 11:1-10
To a people disheartened by the disappointing performance of its rulers, Isaiah presents the vision of a descendant of David, who will promote justice and peace throughout the world.

Second Reading: Letter of Paul to the Romans 15:4-9
About to conclude his letter to the faithful of Rome, the apostle Paul asks for them a harmonious relationship and mutual acceptance – two virtues that we, too, should practice as we prepare for Christmas.

Gospel: Matthew 3:1-12

John the Baptist is clear and even blunt in his appeal to conversion as he reminds us that every tree that does not bear fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. No one should presume to take advantage of God's patience.



"Advent and St. Benedict" refers to connecting the Christian season of Advent (waiting for Christ's coming) with the spiritual wisdom of Saint Benedict (founder of Western monasticism, author of the Rule of St. Benedict), focusing on themes like silent listening, finding Christ in daily life, prayer, work, and spiritual discipline, often through specific readings, retreats, or books. While St. Benedict didn't directly write about Advent in his Rule, his emphasis on deep listening ("ear of your heart"), mindfulness, and finding God in the ordinary makes him a profound guide for this season.

Dear Padre, Do non-Catholics go to heaven?

Yes, they do, because of the grace of God at work in his people. To suggest otherwise would seem to imply that Catholics somehow have a "golden ticket," or some kind of right that simply does not exist. The Incarnation of Jesus healed the division between heaven and earth, a division established by the "sin of Adam" and confirmed by our own lives of sin. Through his passion, death, and resurrection, all has been restored to the manner that the Father first envisioned through his Creation. The division was between humanity and divinity, not between religious practices and divinity. Catholics believe and celebrate that God accepts all people of a good heart and a good spirit. God is not blinded by the labels that sometimes blind his people to the bigger reality. When Catholics, or people of any religion, proclaim exclusivity and specialness, particularly when it concerns eternal life, all people should be very cautious about what they assume. To assume a certain type of arrogance—to yourself and to your belief and life of faith—that excludes others or separates another as "not one of us" simply has no place in the kingdom of God.
