The New Evangelization

This season of the Church we call "Ordinary Time" is full of Jesus' teaching about how to live our Christian lives. Today's readings are especially rich. When Jesus takes his place as the New Moses to deliver his Sermon on the Mount, he begins, fittingly, with a new version of the commandments, but instead of "Thou shalt not," they are blessings! And they are paradoxical; always a sign of the divine touch. The "poor in spirit" get the kingdom of heaven; mourners are blessed, for they shall be comforted. Now, who is supposed to do the comforting? We are. If the beatitudes are new commandments, we disciples are to obey them, even rejoicing in the blessing of persecution. What kind of people sign up for this? Saint Paul describes to the Christians in Corinth what kind of people God chooses: the foolish, the weak, the lowly and despised, the nothings of this world, to shame and confuse those who seem to run things. The wisdom of God seems like nonsense in a world where power reigns supreme. That sweet soul Zephaniah, author of today's first reading, saw the shift coming, from "don'ts" to "dos," from bossy to beatitude: "Seek the Lord, all you humble of the land" □ LEARN ABOUT THE AUTHORS OF OUR PARISH COMMUNITY (Zephaniah 2:3). You will be "a people humble and lowly" who will pasture your flocks (and do the work God intends you to do) with "none to disturb" you (Zephaniah 3:12, 13). 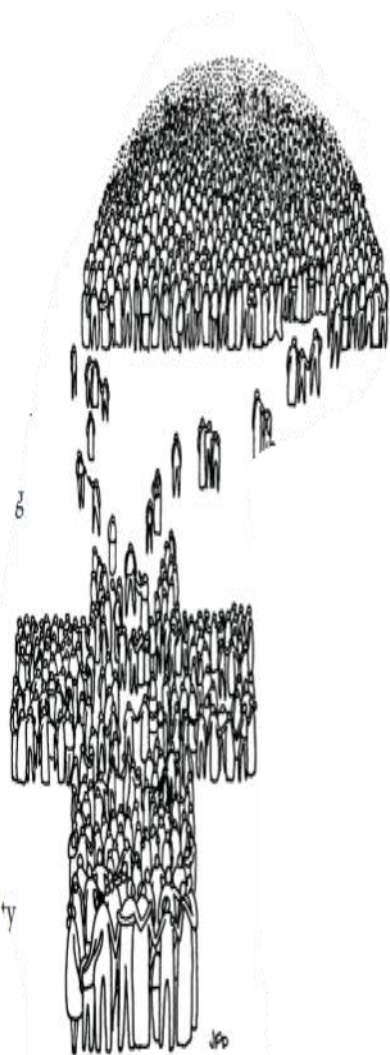

People Who Needed to Hear Good News

These Beatitudes come at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount when Jesus went up a mountain and sat down to teach his disciples. Immediately before this passage, Jesus and his new friends had been traveling throughout Galilee, a poor area of the Middle East under the military occupation of the Roman empire and its brutal military. The people there were burdened by high rates of poverty and high taxes. Jews of those days owed triple taxes: to Rome, to Herod-the local king, and their religious Temple. They experienced tremendous rates of disease and infant and child mortality. Strict religious codes of the time excluded large segments of the population from day-to-day social interaction (women, children, foreigners, the sick and diseased, etc.).

Matthew tells us that in their travels Jesus was busily teaching and preaching the good news and “curing every disease and sickness among the people” (Mt 4:23).

Imagine someone leading a small group of students through an extremely impoverished area of a city where homeless, poor, mentally ill, and sick people are everywhere. Imagine that person unafraid to talk to, touch, and interact with such people. Imagine that person having the boldness to tell them that they are loved, that God has not forgotten them, and that they are valuable. That’s what Jesus had just done teaching the Beatitudes. That was the good news he was bringing to people whom the rest of society had forgotten or cast off. That was the hope he was preaching to others like him who were working for the poor and among the poor.

The Gospel Reading for today is what is popularly called the Sermon on the Mount. Many think it is the absolute epitome of Jesus' teachings. To be sure it tells us how we are to live our lives, the attitudes we are to have. We must remember that those who were waiting and hoping for the Messiah expected a military leader, one who would lead them in battle against their oppressors.

In His Sermon on the Mount Jesus gives a more accurate perspective of Who He is. He begins what we call the Beatitudes (the word means "blessings") with "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." In a sense we are all "poor in spirit." Without the guidance and strength provided us by the Lord there is no way we can escape this poverty of spirit, of spirituality, if you will.

That is why we often say that living God-centered lives is at the very core of stewardship. Being a disciple of Christ translates into being a steward of our many gifts and blessings. Some scholars believe that Jesus may have given this sermon often during His ministry. Those who followed Jesus and became the earliest Christians, the first members of the Church, were fond of quoting and referring to what the Lord said on this occasion. As stated, Jesus provides us with the secret of living a good life. If we rely on Him and follow Him, we will be blessed.

The closure of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome Jan. 6 marked the conclusion of a momentous year of spiritual renewal, learning and engagement for faithful in Hawaii and across the world.

After kneeling at the threshold in prayer, Pope Leo XIV secured the Holy Door — formally ending the Jubilee Year of Hope on the feast of the Epiphany.

"The holy door is closed, but the door of your mercy is not closed," the pope prayed during the ceremony, followed by the celebration of Mass.

For Bishop Larry Silva, watching Pope Francis open the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica on Dec. 24, 2024, and seeing Pope Leo close it earlier this month was one of the highlights of the special year.

"We must never stop growing in our faith, and the best way for us to grow in our faith is to share the faith with others," Bishop Silva said. "We pray that the special graces of the Jubilee Year will keep us faithful and zealous in our mission."

He said that he and many Hawaii Catholics made pilgrimages to Rome during the holy year. He even had a "blessed meeting" with the newly elected Pope Leo.
